SCWK-3813. Native Cultural Identity and Cultural Survival (NATI)

SCWK-3843. Suicide and Indigenous Peoples (NATI)

SCWK-5006. Preparation for Professional Social Work Practice (F)

SCWK-5023. The Profession of Social Work in Context (F) (K)

SCWK-5036. Theory of Social Work Practice I (F) (K)

SCWK-5116. Generalist Social Work Practice Skills (F) (K)

The student will demonstrate a working knowledge of the field of social work practice, including the roles and responsibilities of social workers. SCWK-5213. Fundamentals of Community Organizing (F)

SCWK-5513. Social Work, Organizations and Native People (K)

This course provides a comprehensive overview of the social work profession, its history, and its role in society. SCWK-5713. Introduction to Research Methods and Statistics in Social Work (Indigenous Focus) (F) (K)

This course introduces students to the fundamental research methods and statistical techniques used in social work research. The course emphasizes the importance of ethical considerations and cultural sensitivity in research, particularly when working with Indigenous populations. The course also explores the application of research findings to social work practice and policy development.

SCWK-5723. Child Welfare (F) (Elective)

It explores the historical and cultural context of child welfare, as well as the current challenges and trends in the field. The course covers topics such as child abuse and neglect, foster care, adoption, and the role of social workers in assessing and supporting children and families in need. SCWK-5733. Social Work and Aging (F) (Elective)

SCWK-5763. Spirituality and Social Work (K)
