**ANTH-1013. Introduction to Cultural Anthropology**

This course introduces students to the study of human culture and society. It covers the history of anthropology, the four-field approach, and the study of culture change and evolution.

**ANTH-1023. Introduction to Biological Anthropology**

This course introduces students to the study of human evolution and biological anthropology. It covers the history of biological anthropology, the study of primate and human evolution, and the study of human variation and adaptation.

**ANTH-1033. Introduction to Archaeology**

This course introduces students to the study of human history and culture through the study of the archaeological record. It covers the history of archaeology, the study of prehistoric and historic sites, and the study of human culture change and evolution. **B** This course is a prerequisite for ANTH 2033, ANTH 2043, and ANTH 2053. **L** This course is a prerequisite for ANTH 3123.

**ANTH-2013. Area Ethnography: South America**

This course introduces students to the study of human culture and society in South America. It covers the history of ethnography in South America, the study of indigenous and modern societies, and the study of human culture change and evolution. **A-** 1013.

**ANTH-2033. Area Ethnography: Indigenous Lifeways in Canada**

This course introduces students to the study of human culture and society in Canada. It covers the history of ethnography in Canada, the study of indigenous and modern societies, and the study of human culture change and evolution. **A-** 1013.

**ANTH-2043. Area Ethnography: Mexico and Central America**

This course introduces students to the study of human culture and society in Mexico and Central America. It covers the history of ethnography in Mexico and Central America, the study of indigenous and modern societies, and the study of human culture change and evolution. **A-** 1013.

**ANTH-2053. Area Ethnography: Europe**

**ANTH-2303. Issues in Archaeology**

This course provides an overview of the issues in archaeology. Areas covered include: A-1013.

**ANTH-2323. Archaeology of Early Societies: Eurasia, Africa, Oceania**

This course provides an overview of the archaeology of early societies in Eurasia, Africa, and Oceania. Areas covered include: A-1013.

**ANTH-2333. World Archaeology**

This course provides an overview of world archaeology. Areas covered include: A-1013.

**ANTH-2343. Archaeology of Early Societies: North and Central America**

This course provides an overview of the archaeology of early societies in North and Central America. Areas covered include: A-1013, 14,000.

**ANTH-2353. Archaeology of Early Societies: South America**

This course provides an overview of the archaeology of early societies in South America. Areas covered include: A-1013, 12,000.

**ANTH 2363. Archaeology of Early Societies: Mesoamerica**

This course provides an overview of the archaeology of early societies in Mesoamerica. Areas covered include: A-1013, 10,000.

### **ANTH-2413. Human Biological Variation**

This course examines the biological variation of modern humans and the evolutionary processes that have shaped this variation. Topics include: genetic variation, phenotypic variation, and the role of natural selection, genetic drift, and migration in the evolution of modern humans. The course also explores the relationship between biological variation and human adaptation to different environments.

### **ANTH-2423. Human Evolution: Fact and Theory**

This course explores the scientific evidence for human evolution and the theories that explain the patterns of human evolution. Topics include: the fossil record, comparative anatomy, and molecular biology. The course also discusses the role of natural selection and genetic drift in the evolution of modern humans.

### **ANTH-2443. Human Skeletal Biology**

This course examines the biological variation of the human skeleton and the evolutionary processes that have shaped this variation. Topics include: the structure and function of the human skeleton, the role of natural selection and genetic drift in the evolution of the human skeleton, and the relationship between skeletal variation and human adaptation to different environments.

### **ANTH-2513. Cultural Anthropology**

This course explores the cultural diversity of modern humans and the evolutionary processes that have shaped this diversity. Topics include: the role of culture in human evolution, the relationship between culture and biology, and the evolution of modern humans. The course also discusses the role of natural selection and genetic drift in the evolution of modern humans.

**ANTH-4023. Celtic Musics and Invented Traditions in Atlantic Canada**

This course explores the history and evolution of Celtic music in Atlantic Canada, focusing on the role of music in the construction of regional identity and the relationship between music and the land. The course covers the history of Celtic music in the region, from the early 19th century to the present, and examines the ways in which music has been used to create a sense of community and belonging. **ANTH-4553. Independent Study**

This course provides an opportunity for students to conduct independent research in anthropology. The student works with a faculty advisor to develop a research proposal and complete a thesis. The course is designed for students with a strong interest in anthropology and a desire to conduct original research.
